

# PROPORTION PAID TO STATE AND COUNTY IS LESS THAN YEAR AGO

Proportion Paid to State and County is Less Than Year Ago

## FIGURES ARE GIVEN

Bloomfield Township's share of the state and county tax this year is to be well under that of last year, although the assessed and equalized valuation this year has materially increased it is announced today by Robert Y. Moore, supervisor.

This year's assessed valuation of Bloomfield Township is nearly four million over that for 1927. The total for this year is \$3,119,925. Last year it was \$2,826,500.

Equalized valuation this year is approximately three million dollars over that of last year. This year's figure is \$3,250,000. Last year it was \$3,000,000.

Although Bloomfield Township's valuation was increased over last year, it pays a smaller proportion of the assessed and equalized valuation because of increased valuations in other sections, including its own.

## SCHOOL CENSUS SHOWS GAIN

Increase in Number Of Students Reported To Board
