Dequindre Road To Be Lighted By Detroit Edison Company

A new type of electric lighting is being installed on the Dequindre road in Troy Township according to E. W. Bricker, of the Detroit Edison company.

"The ordinary light installed over a circle around itself some space, but it lights a good portion of the country around, and so wastes light. The new globes have a shade on each end which cuts the light off from the surrounding territory, and throws it further up and down the road, making an eclipse of light. This is a far more effective, naturally," Mr. Bricker said.

The Dequindre job is but one of several constructions being worked on by the company at the present time, he said.
