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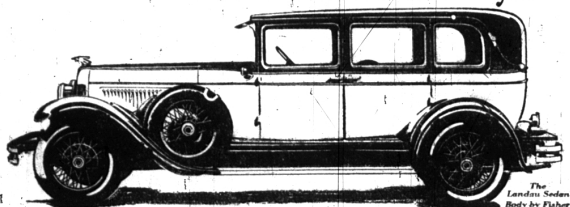

New York—Every time newspaper darts off variations of the headline, "U. S. LAUNCHES NEW DRY WAR ON BROADWAY," and put them on first page, it is not to announce new laws, order additional supplies and prepare for increased customers. They know that lots of customers who haven't been around for weeks and months will be in again, their interest in drinking revived and whetted. Other and less sophisticated clients, with fears that the application of the sponge will be more or less successful, are impelled to test their collars as a precaution against a possible period of drought. And folks who really don't care much about drinking back into the speakeasies because it is "the thing to do," for imbibing in bottle parlors instead of at home becomes fashionable again whenever a "dry war" increases the glamour of breaking the law in them.

Just human nature, that's all. Another result of "dry wars" such as the one now being reported to the hinterland, is that restaurants resume use of tea caddies for serving cocktails and highballs.

What to do with pets while the family is away on vacation is no problem in New York. There are "cuddles" at which birds, fish, dogs, cats, monkeys, and even houseplants may be boarded by the week.

The "hotels" usually consist of an office in the city and a farm in the country where the pets may enjoy their respite from life in the city. Many persons who remain in the city for the summer send their dogs and cats to such farms in order to save them from being affected by the heat.

This is the pet's paradise. There are "hotels" for them, hospitals, luxury shops, beauty shops, and confectioneries devoted exclusively to dogs, cats and such.

Five years ago short skirts, revealing legs and knees (as often as not, fat, billowy legs and knees) attracted attention. Now it's the other way around. On a walk along Fifth avenue, I wouldn't let my eyes rest on a pretty girl whose dress was unusually long. Two women stopped to turn around and gaze at her, and I heard one of them say:

GRAHAM-PAIGE BEATS PREVIOUS OUTPUT RECORDS

43,556 Cars Built To July 18, Exceeded Full 1934 Production

Production by the Graham-Paige Motors Corporation for 1934 reached 43,556 on July 18, passing the total for the entire year 1933, which has heretofore stood as the high record for production in the 18 years' history of the factory. The next day production put the total over 43,562, double the output for all last year. All old records for production, by the day, week, month, and year, have now been surpassed by the new line of cars introduced this year by the three Graham brothers as the first passenger cars to bear their name.

The Grahams, having acquired ownership control of the Paige-Detroit company in June, 1927, announced the completely new line of cars January 7, this year, at the New York automobile show. However, it was not until January 20, when the 200th car was built, that the factory was actually in volume production of the new models. Thus, in only six months' actual production, Graham-Paige has equalled the best previous record for an entire year and doubled the 1927 total.

Improvements and enlargements that will increase the factory capacity from 400 cars to 600 cars a day have been begun by Graham-Paige to meet the demand brought about by the quick acceptance of the new line by the motoring public. The erection of new buildings and the installation of new equipment, both at its main plant and at the body plant at Wayne, to cost in excess of \$700,000, are now going ahead rapidly. In addition, the company has purchased a group of buildings at Fort and McKinstry streets, Detroit, with a total of 262,000 square feet of floor space, to which will be moved the service and export shipping departments, releasing more space at the Warren avenue main plant for production.

Chrysler Style Show Held Here Last Saturday

Twelve automobiles, models for the Chrysler Style Show, were on display in Birmingham last Saturday afternoon. The Plymouth and the Chrysler 65 and 75 were on display with four models of each. The parade arrived here about 2:15 p. m. and remained in the village for about one hour. It has visited all of the more important cities and villages in the Southern Peninsula and passed through Birmingham last Wednesday en route to Pontiac.

Many persons witnessed the parade and later saw the models at the Chrysler Display room, Horace Shaw, of Shaw Bros., Birmingham agents for the Chrysler, says that already many visitors have come to their display room.

"We have felt a quickening interest in the Chrysler since the style show," Mr. Shaw said. This is Only One of These. Although only a tattooer's son, he has designs on the girl, but she was an architect's daughter and had other plans.—Crimson Colt.

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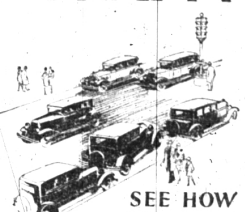
