ORDINANCE NO. 144
An ordinance amending Section Four of Ordinance No. 121 of the Village of Birmingham, entitled "Producers' License."

THE VILLAGE OF BIRMINGHAM ORDAINS:
That Section 4 of said Ordinance No. 121 be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 4. This Ordinance shall not apply to any person who shall sell products or goods manufactured in another state, from samples or otherwise, where the products or goods so sold are there, after to be delivered or shipped by the manufacturer to the purchaser direct in interstate or foreign commerce.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage thereof.
