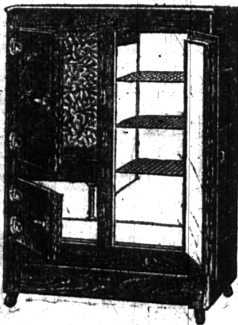

Chief of Police James Anderson returned Monday evening from the annual International Convention of chiefs of police, held at Colorado Springs last week. Chief Anderson says that the convention was the best of its kind he has known and reported an enthusiastic and interesting series of meetings as part of the program.

Police chief, department superintendents, detective chiefs, and other police officers, to the number of nearly 600, met at a Colorado Springs hotel for the convention.

A varied and interesting program marked the meetings throughout. On the program were trips to the mountains, mines, and lumber camps around the city; picnics, special programs, demonstrations, and other interesting features. One highly educational exhibit was a mock battle with gas masks, including gas, and other implements of underworld warfare.

During the convention at the meetings, various chiefs of police, department officers, and other persons not connected with the forces spoke on topics of interest to the delegates. A favorite topic of the speakers was the relation of police and the press, most of the speakers in favor of wide use of newspapers.

A number of resolutions carrying startling innovations and regulations in present systems were passed by the delegates. One such resolution states that while 80 per cent of the deaths in America are caused by firearms, the police chiefs are in favor of laws which will prohibit the sale of any weapons of this sort. They resolved themselves to be in hearty co-operation with a Federal law which will ban or lessen the danger of death, through the sale of firearms.

Another resolution passed by the department heads was against the common practice of motorists who follow fire engines to large conflagrations. The chiefs were in favor of a law, the resolution stated, which would prohibit motorists following the apparatus nearer than within three blocks of the fire, thus eliminating danger to the fire, thus eliminating danger to the fire, thus eliminating danger to the fire.
