## HOUSEHOLD HINTS

**MENU HINT**  
A big dish of spaghetti and cheese is an excellent substitute for meat and potatoes. In the following recipe you are told just how to make it. The amount of cheese you use should be decided according to individual taste. Some like only a slightly cheesy flavor, so a mild cheese and less of it than the recipe calls for should be used. But if your family is fond of cheese, use a snap-py cheese and plenty of it.

## Today's Recipes

**Spaghetti and Cheese**—Boil spaghetti in salted water until tender, about 15 minutes. Make a cream cheese sauce by blending two tablespoons of butter with two tablespoons of flour. Then add a little at a time, one and one-half cups of milk. When thick and smooth add one-quarter pound of American cheese rubbed through a grater, salt and pepper to taste, and cook until the cheese is melted. Put the cheese into a casserole, cover with the sauce, sprinkle the top with grated cheese and bread crumbs and heat in the oven until crumbs are brown.

## Suggestions

**Make Doll's House**  
Vacation brings the problem of busy work for small fingers to do on rainy days and Sunday afternoons. Making and furnishing a doll's house is a task to occupy many hours, and one which may be adapted to various ages.

The house itself may be made of an orange box or a cardboard box or built of wallboard by older youngsters. Quaint cracker and other boxes, spoils, bits of string and cloth, as well as scissors and glue, will be needed in making the furnishings. Let the child use his own ingenuity, with an occasional suggestion from mother.

## Face Powder

When you open your new box of powder do not tear off the paper that covers the powder, but with a stiletto or nut pick make 10 or 12 small holes in the paper cover, then place over it a powder puff that fits. Put on the box lid, turn box upside-down, give it a pat to get the powder on the puff. This method will not only keep the dressing table in a neat condition, but the powder lasts much longer.

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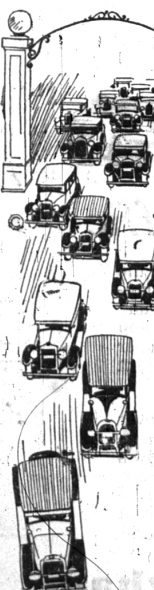
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## AUTOMOBILE INJURES CHILD

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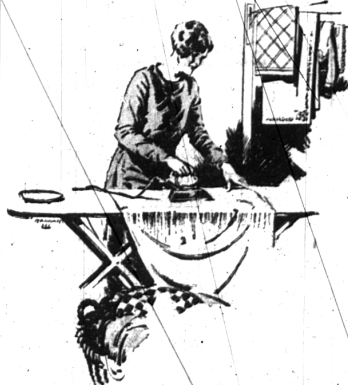
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
