finding trip to the Pacific coast and return, according to an announcement. The national air tour this year will be staged as a part of the Detroit Air-Olympic, June 30. The other events on the large program are the Gordon Bennett International Balloon race, the Boy's National Model Airplane contest, an exhibition of glider flying and the annual aeronautical session of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. The program has been sponsored by the Detroit board of commerce, with the cooperation of Frank W. Blair and Edward S. Evans, active workers of the Aircraft Events committee.

But, then, if a man's wife went along he wouldn't need ten books."

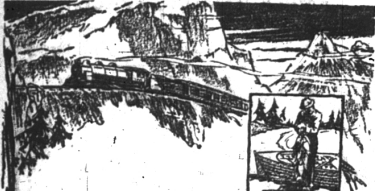
