BULLETS FLY IN TROY CHASE

Deputy Nabs Alleged Rum Runners After Wild Ride

Bullets and jugs, filled with alleged whisky, flew through the air in a thrilling chase over the roads in Troy Township Thursday afternoon which culminated in the arrest of two Pontiac men by Deputy Albert Ekstrom on charges of transporting liquor.

The men arrested gave their names as Lester Laidler, 21 years old and Clarence Miller, 24 years old, both of 211 Oliver street, Pontiac.

Ekstrom noticed the men when he heard the clinking of bottles in the rear of a car they were driving on Main street road near Troy ball. He is alleged to have thrown them into the road in an attempt to puncture Ekstrom's tires. One bottle struck the rear of the car and the officers motorcycle and although it pitched sharply the officers kept on. He was firing at the tires of the racing car ahead while holding onto his mount with one hand.

(Coming abreast of the liquor car, Ekstrom was almost thrown into the ditch when Miller swerved his car sharply. Jumping on to the car Ekstrom poked his twenty gun into the ribs of one of the men and forced him to stop the car. Only three gallons of alleged whisky remained.

In municipal court examinations were asked for the men by their attorney, Clarence L. Smith. The hearings were set for June 14 and bail was fixed at \$600 each.

Under The Hood

MORE CLEARLY DEFINED
Several places about the automobile should be lubricated with a "light machine oil." His advisers, however, frequently fail to define just what they mean by a lubricant of this character. Without exception, the oil specified is that used in lubricating such light machines as typewriters and sewing machines. In other words, the "light" has reference specifically, although it also describes the oil with accuracy.

FRICION CREATES SPARK
Motorists who take the precaution to strain the gasoline through a chamois as it goes into the tank might well add another precaution. That is to make certain that the funnel is held firmly against the side of the tank. In passing through the chamois, the gasoline creates friction which in turn may be converted into static electricity. A dangerous spark which might ignite the vapor will be prevented in case the funnel or metal end of the hose line is held against the gasoline tank.

GENEROSITY IS HURTEFUL
Lubrication bearings probably suffer more from under-lubrication than from too much of it, but a service record indicates that at least some motorists make the mistake of being too generous when lubricating the hard-working unit. Where the bearing is lubricated by a grease cup, the owner should realize that the cap never should be turned more than one revolution at a time. Grabbing of the clutch is the common aftermath of giving the bearing an overdose of lubricant.

THERE IS A DIFFERENCE
There is a difference between the size of the spark plug gap that current will jump when it is outside of the cylinder. A width that will be cleared when the plug is being tested when out of its port may be altogether too great for efficient functioning when in place. The difference is accounted for in the increased resistance of the compressed gases when the plug is in place.

OLD BULBS GOOD GUIDES
Wie a bulb—headlight, tail light, dashlight or any other kind—has burned out, the careful motorist will not throw it away the instant it is removed from its socket. Before doing so, he will notice its specifications so that the one used in replacement will be exactly the same power, car manufacturers are specific in stating just what size and type of bulb shall be used. Since they have arrived at their decisions as a result of thorough study, the motorist would do well to abide by their decisions.

STRAIGHT 8'S HAVE DAY AS SPEEDERS

Another entry in the long list of speedway races, which have been dominated by straight eight cylinder cars is recorded in the results of the 1928 famous Indianapolis Memorial Day Classic, according to DuBois Young, president of the Hupp Motor Car corporation.

"This is the fifth successive year in which every car in the money at Indianapolis has been a straight eight," said Mr. Young. "Not until as far back as 1923 has there been a break in the consecutive clean sweep of eight-cylinder cars. This year a four cylinder car, of European make, was eighth, in no year since then has anything but a straight eight appeared among the winning cars. It is a remarkable and, in my opinion, a conclusive demonstration of the basic soundness of the straight eight principle."

The car was the same one which finished third place last year under the control of Tony Galotta. A hearing will be held next Monday night by the village commission between parties interested in installing a water main on Dorchester road, south of Lincoln avenue.

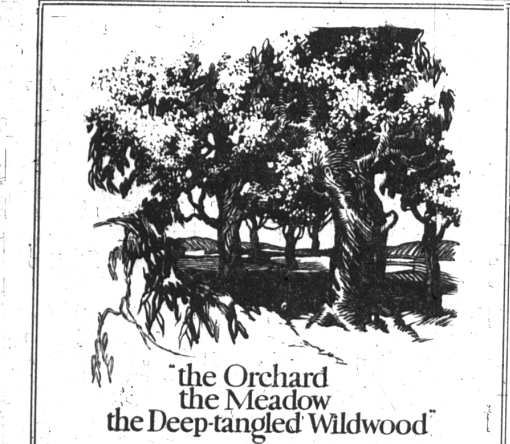

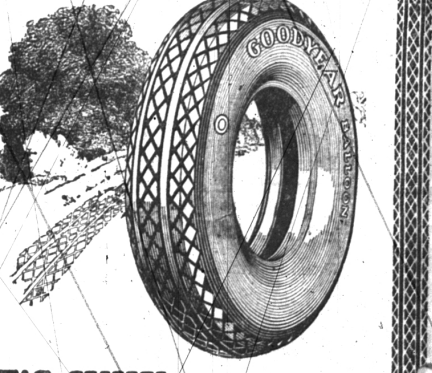
