She asks me what I think of it. Well, I think these youngsters are striving hard to be ready to take up life where their mothers leave it off.

But this kind of a letter really touches my heart. I have lived in Minnesota myself. I know the little town in which this faithful follower of my column lives. It is to the people in these whole some little towns that I feel a special responsibility in writing these daily lines. When I have a letter from one of them, I always think that perhaps I have not written as well or as helpfully as these good readers deserve.

Most people feel a reluctance to write a letter. When they write to me about the simple and beautiful things of life, I know that they believe in my writing and believe that I will be interested in their lives and their joys and sorrows. And I am. I sat for a quarter of an hour, picturing to myself this Minnesota home, with the sort of family life that produces the citizens upon whom we must count for the greater America of tomorrow.
