Detroit, June 20.—The largest attendance in the history of the Michigan State Fair is expected here September 2-8, with prospects pointing to nearly 400,000 persons viewing the 79th annual exhibition. With this anticipated increase over last year, when 250,000 paid admission to the grounds, the handicap of two rainy days, facilities for entering and leaving the grand stand have been enlarged two and one-half times, providing easier and more rapid access to the stands. Entries in this department will close promptly Saturday, August 18 exhibitors will be released on Saturday, Sept. 8. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged each exhibitor in all classes except the Horse Show.

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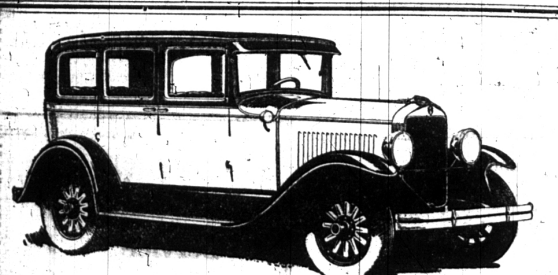
