

DRIVERS PAY HEAVY FINES

Drunk Motorists Top Speeders In Amounts For Month

Of the \$108 paid in fines in Justice Floyd Buck's court for arrests during May, \$290 was collected from three drunken drivers and \$187 from speeders, who numbered 18, according to Justice Buck's report filed today.

These records show six cases of drunken and disorderly conduct, three reckless drivers, two driving without operator's license, two violating traffic signals, one driving left of street and one violator of the law pertaining to the keeping of dogs.

In the state car's Justice Buck's records show fines amounting to \$30, with five violators of the game law, four cases of disorderly conduct, four cases of violation, one case of obtaining money by false pretenses, one violation of the dog law, one case of dumping rubbish on the road, one violator of the motor vehicle law, and one case of felonious assault.
