Citizens Of Lincoln Avenue Force Hearing On Wider Pavement

Adjourned regular meeting of the Village Commission called to order, 7 p. m. Present at roll call: President Woodward, Trustees, Wallace, Whittlesey. Quorum being present, meeting was opened for business.

Section 1. That the resolution be adopted, Res. No. 119.
The President brought up for discussion and consideration Ordinance No. 16 known as the "Annual Village Appropriation Bill."

The following resolution was introduced by Commissioner Robhm. It is recommended that the same be adopted, Res. No. 120.
"Annual Village Appropriation Bill" be laid over to February 21, 1928, and seconded by Commissioner Wallace. Whereupon the resolution be adopted. Roll Call: Yeas, 4; Nays, 0.

The following resolution was introduced by Commissioner Robhm. It is recommended that the same be adopted, Res. No. 121.
"Annual Village Appropriation Bill" be laid over to February 21, 1928, and seconded by Commissioner Wallace. Whereupon the resolution be adopted. Roll Call: Yeas, 4; Nays, 0.

Commissioner Robhm then moved the adoption of Ordinance No. 16, known as the "Annual Village Appropriation Bill," said Ordinance reading as follows:

Section 1. That this ordinance shall cover the Annual Village Appropriation Bill.

Section 2. That the sum of \$150,000.00, as recommended by the Board of Trustees, shall be and the same is hereby approved and adopted as the appropriation bill for the year, 1928, according to the following items:

Salaries and wages	\$ 1,000.00
Printing	250.00
Purchasing equipment	500.00
Light and heat	250.00
Highway building	250.00
Highway widening	2,000.00
Highway improvement	4,000.00
Total	\$11,000.00

Section 3. That the amount specified in Sec. 2 be and the same are hereby appropriated for the purposes therein set forth for the next fiscal year, and that the same shall be raised by general taxation upon the assessed valuation of all taxable property within the Village.

Section 4. That the Village Clerk is ordered to certify amount appropriated in this ordinance to the Village Assessor.

Section 5. That public necessity and the provisions of the Charter require the immediate adoption of this ordinance. Therefore, that this ordinance shall take immediate effect.

Made and passed by the Commission of Bloomfield Hills Village on the 22th day of February, 1928.

BOARD VETOES PAVING GROUP

Recommendation of Money For City-Village Committee Is Not Approved

Feeling that the payment of \$250 to John Gaffill, voluntary member of the recent city-village committee, for services as fiscal advisor rendered during the investigation of the school code, was being a bad precedent for future civic committees, the village commission Monday night deciding against making the payment.

According to reports, the suggestion for paying Mr. Gaffill for his extensive study of the subject came from Thomas E. Parker, Chairman of the committee, and was later sent to the village commission as a recommendation.

Village President H. T. Ellerby, although admitting the effort of Mr. Gaffill a worthy one, was opposed by commissioner Hulbert and others in the belief that the request be denied. Commissioner Henry stated he, too, was against the payment but might consider paying \$500 or \$100 each to Messrs. Gaffill, Parker and Lewis; he then said that perhaps another \$100 might be given to Commissioner Hulbert. The latter, however, was emphatic in his objection to such an arrangement, stating that his work on the committee was a public service on his part.
