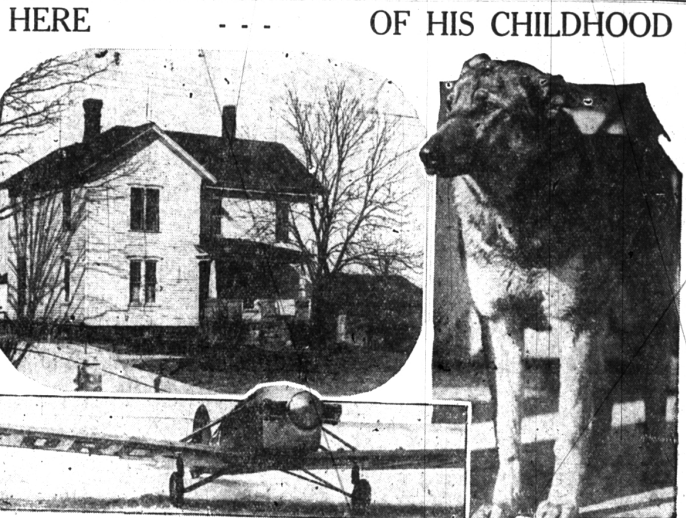


Harry Brooks waived a friendly "Good-bye" to his truck off from the Ford airport for his trip to Miami.
