CHILD CRIPPLE REPORT MADE

Improvement Shown After Work, Secretaries Tells Rotarians

Conditions for the crippled child in Oakland County have become vastly improved since the formation of the Oakland County Chapter of the Michigan Society for Crippled Children. Hundreds of cases have been assisted in this county during the past three years, and plans are now under way to expand the scope of the chapter, so that double the number of children may be helped to better health. This is what Dr. Harold Roehm, chairman of the county chapter, Miss Leola B. Jacques, physio-therapist for the chapter, and David Laid, in charge of the work in and near Birmingham, told members of the Birmingham Rotary club Monday noon.

Lantern slides were shown during the talks in the Chateau Tea Room depicting the before and after conditions of crippled children who have been helped by the chapter. During 1927 Miss Jacques reported that a total of 128 children had been cared for in some way by the chapter. Of this number 44 were hospitalized, 28 were operated upon, 708 physio-therapy treatments had been given and 640 home calls were made.

PROPOSITION 1 Shall the Village of Birmingham borrow the sum of Sixty-six Thousand Dollars (\$66,000.00) and issue the bonds of the Village therefor, for the purpose of completing the new Municipal Building in accordance with the plans and drawings heretofore approved by the said Commission and paying the unpaid balance on lots and parcels of land on which the said Municipal Building is to be erected, and for landscaping and constructing sidewalks and driveways around said building and equipping the said building and for other incidental expenses necessary to the completion of said building not included in the plans and drawings aforesaid?

PROPOSITION 2 Shall the Village of Birmingham borrow the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) and issue bonds of the Village therefor, for the purpose of paying for lots 44, 46, 64 and 65 of Merrill's Plat of the Village of Birmingham, Oakland County, Michigan?

PROPOSITION 3 Shall the Village of Birmingham borrow the sum of Sixty-seven Thousand Dollars (\$67,000.00) and issue the bonds of the Village therefor, for the purpose of extending the waterworks of the Village by adding thereto; one new unit, consisting of one new well of approximately 350 G. P. M. capacity, equipped with a motor driven deep well turbine, together with pump house, necessary watermain and appurtenances for connection

PROPOSITION 4 Shall the Village of Birmingham borrow the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) and issue the bonds of the Village therefor, for the purpose of reconstructing and modifying the sewer and water systems and cross connections therefor, on Woodward Avenue between Oak Street on the North and Lincoln Avenue on the South, in collaboration with State Highway Department in the widening of said Woodward Avenue between the streets aforesaid?

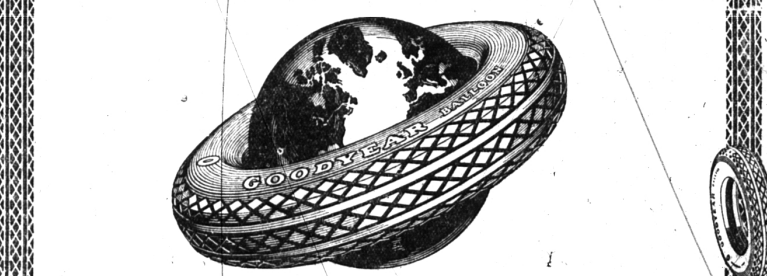
