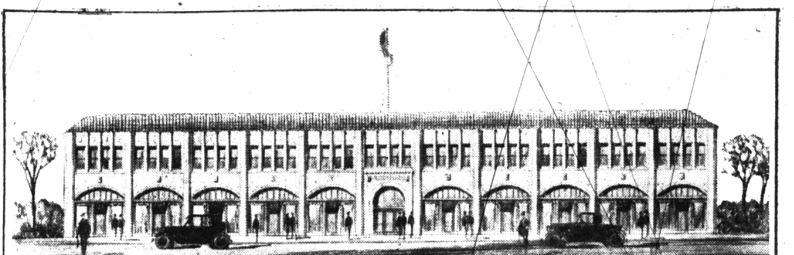
The foreground with a long field goal to which he added a free throw point. Frantz speed and over six misses in attempts to score by the Maroons completed the tilt with a final record of 21-18.

LEGION NOT IN POLITICS, SAYS STANLEY

Commander Scores Candidates Using Organization's Name

CITES CONSTITUTION

The American Legion is non-partisan and is not affiliated with any political faction in the village. This statement was made last night by Lloyd L. Stanley, commander of the Legion here after he heard that candidates in the coming elections were using the name of Charles Edwards' Post of the Legion in their campaigns.

"The constitution of the Legion will not allow the organization to take sides," he said.

A section taken from the association's constitution by Mr. Stanley follows: "The American Legion shall be absolutely non-political and shall not be used for the dissemination of partisan principles nor for the promotion of the candidacy of any persons seeking public office or preferment. No candidate for an incumbent or a remunerative elective public office, shall hold any office in this post."

In another section of the written laws it says: "The Legion is a civilian organization; membership therein does not effect nor increase the liability for military or
