#### COURT FIVE AGAIN BOW

The Baldwin basketball aspirants bowed to Mt. Clemens in the final contest of the scheduled season. The game marked the ninth defeat of the Maroon cagers in their program of 12 matches. The Bathers struck a lead soon after the tilt commenced and did not drop to their opponents once, winning by a score of 34-24.

Smith's pelting of the backboard featured the rough and tumble contest in which the two quintets engaged. Smith, a Mt. Clemens forward, banked up 13 points before he was removed from the contest on personal fouls late in the fourth quarter. He accumulated five units on free throws alone, and with four field goals most of which were long heaves, was the star marksman in the final period. During the game 26 personal fouls were called by the referee.

Cox, playing guard and later moved to center, stood out in scoring for the Bathers. He was accredited with nine points while H. Schwarze marked up eight. A. Bather forward, and son of J. B. The only other high scorer of the game, with seven points.

Tightening defenses on both sides held the scoring down in the last quarter. The play and scoring was even. Numerous fouls were tossed besides a field goal or two, before the final gun set down the curtain on a scoreboard reading Birmingham-24, Opponents-34.

To-morrow night the Maroon crew coached by George Johnson journey to Pontiac High School to take part in the county tournament there. A victory over Ferndale, who was defeated by the Baldwinites in the preliminaries, will mean a meeting of the winner of the St. Mary-Royal Oak match Saturday night. A loss will cap the season for Birmingham. Play will begin last Friday, the villagers bowed to Ferndale in an even match. Unless some improvement is witnessed in the play of the Maroons, they will be unable to survive the Ferndale match. However, as Ferndale's first victory over the villagers was considered lucky, a good chance is afforded to win, many say.
