INCREASE SEEN FOR SCHOOLS

New High Mark in Enrollment Already Is Scored

With the second school semester well under way, additional increase in the total enrollment of Birmingham schools is seen. The last official total is 2,294, but a number of students have come in since it was taken, according to Clarence M. Vliet, superintendent of schools, and the total is now more than 2,300. "At the present rate of increase, with new students coming in almost every day, it is more than likely that our enrollment will reach 2,500 by June," Mr. Vliet said.

The official total, 2,294, is greater by 527 than the total for the same date two years ago. In February, 1926, the enrollment was 1,767. At the same time last year it was 2,033.

The progress on the new Quaker School is certainly gratifying in view of this increase," Mr. Vliet said. "Work on the roof and the interior of the corridors is proceeding today, and by Apr. 1 we will be considering bids for the building. It seems certain that the building will be complete by Jul. 1, the date set in the contract."
