Anyway, this is what I think about it. I think American policemen are, by and large, entirely too officious and too lacking in courtesy. I think there is nobody just like William Allen White, and that we need a dozen like him very urgently. I think we are not getting as much out of our public school plants as could be got out of them. Every public school auditorium ought to be available for the use of adults every evening when it is not being used by the children, and high school swimming pools and gymnasiums ought to be large enough to accommodate the public after school hours.

I think Gene Tunney is a nice boy who is very much embarrassed by all the hokum about his scholarship. I think most of our short stories are too long, and that one of the best short stories ever written is "The Great Au" by Irvin Cobb.
