THURSDAY MUSICAL MEMBERS GIVE PROGRAM AT MEETING

The program given by the Thursday Musicals of Birmingham last Thursday morning was an interesting exhibition of the talents of its own members, the chorus of 11 voices appearing in two groups of songs, and Mrs. Eva DeVieger in a cycle of songs by Wilford Sanderson. A paper on "Religious Music" written by Mrs. Joseph Little and read by Mrs. W. Whiting Raymond gave a timely background for the music which was executive board's program.

In her paper Mrs. Little traced the development of religious music from the Greek chant, its earliest form, through the hymn to the stately oratorio in the modern symphonies and operas, showing its connection along the way with other art forms, particularly architecture. Harmony was introduced into the chant about 800 A. D. and among the first writers of hymns were mentioned Isaac Watts and Charles Wesley whose hymns are still included in standard hymnals.

Mrs. DeVieger's voice showed to advantage in the cycle consisting of "O Night, O Life," "Tired Hands," "Crescent Moon," and "Harbor Night Songs." She was accompanied at the piano by Miss Cheryl Haynes, who gave her ably in the chorus under the direction of Mrs. Arthur Neff, showing decided improvement in its work and spirited and the voices were blended excellently. Mrs. Edgar Bailey at the piano helped to give the performance a quality which was enthusiastically applauded by the audience. In the first group, the two Russian chants "We Praise Thee," by Shvidof, and "Praise Thee the Name of the Lord," by Nikolay were given with dignity and solemnity. "King Alfred's Hymn" by Hamilton MacDougall was sung in this group with Mrs. Herbert Moore, Mrs. Herbert H. Gardner and Mrs. R. H. White in the solo parts. In the second group there were three songs by Edward Gerland, "O Lovely Day," "Song of the Shepherd," "Orpheus with his Lute" and an adaptation of the English hunting song "John Peel." 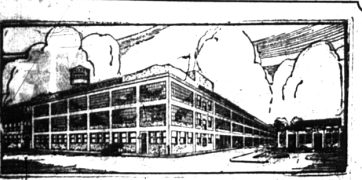
