RECORDS FALL IN HIGH WIN

Baldwin Tracksters Romp Over Rochester in 69-17 Victory

The Birmingham thineclad again demonstrated their superiority to Rochester's team by running wild in the meet on the Baldwin high school track last week by a score of 69-17.

Birmingham was able to finish first in every event. Milton Fortous was again high point man, totaling 12 1/4 joints, while Milton Thomson ranked second with 9 1/2 units. Home team runners slammed in two events, the 25 yard dash, with Porteous, Harry York and Robert Lyon finishing respectively, first, second and third, and the mile run in which Alfred Myhrs, G. Winborn and Nelson Wolman crossed the line successively.

Begides taking all first places the Maroon squad also gained four seconds and seven thirds. Porteous accumulated his points by winning both the 25 and the 220 yard dashes, placing third in the high jump and running in the relay. Others who took honors are Oak De Berg, who won the 440 yard dash, Carter, the low hurdles, Thomson the high sticks, Roderick Cox, the high jump and Lyon the century run.

Two new indoor records were set. James Brien, sprinted the half mile in the time of 2:14.8, and the relay team, consisting of York, Thomson, Porteous and Lyon, ran the mile in which Alfred Myhrs, G. Winborn and Nelson Wolman crossed the line successively.

Many attempts to edit a school paper have failed in past years, but with the combined interest of printing and journalism classes the new paper is expected to be more successful.

The Baldwin paper consists of four pages which are devoted to departmental news, personals, art and sports. The front page print is left until the last page so that fresh news can be supplied there.

The feature of the first edition was an editorial in memory of Harry Brooks, a writup on the Junior play and an editorial supplement on the science department. According to Howard Crull, head of the printing department the next edition will be larger.

The editors of the Maroon and White, official publication of Baldwin High School, and the first issue of which appeared last Thursday, believe that the article which appeared in the columns of the Eccentric may be misleading or not clear.

The publication is entirely the product of Baldwin students. Four Junior High pupils, Kent Gillespie and Phyllis Adams, of the seventh grade, and Bob Thomas and David Curry for the eighth grade, serve as class reporters. They are the only Junior High members of the staff.

Headed by the editor-in-chief, with Geraldine Kessler as associate editor, Dumont Mills is business manager. Betty Kidder is in charge of personals and Howard Sentency is departmental editor. Sports are handled by Jack Moss, Jack Savage, and Lily holds the position of mechanical superintendent. 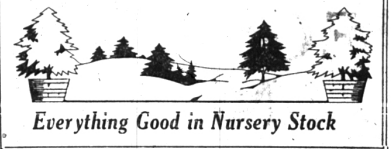
