STUDENTS FINED AS DISORDERLY

St. Marys College Men Pay \$50 Each In Justice Court Here

Making merry too openly Sunday night Stanley Feigas and John Harski, both from St. Mary's College near Orchard Lake and Nick Dupast, 35 Howard Street, Pontiac, each, \$50.

The trio was arrested in Bloomfield Hills by police whose suspicions were aroused by the driving of the merry-makers. A search of the two cars driven revealed 5 quarts of liquor, police say.

The offenders were brought into Justice of Peace Floyd S. Buck's court to face a charge of disorderly conduct Monday and given an option of 30 days or a fine of \$50. Each paid the fine.

BAN ON DOGS IS EXTENDED

Vaccination Ordered Following Increase in Number Of Rabie Cases

The dog quarantine in Oakland County will continue until June 10 because of a continued number of cases of rabies, according to word received from the state department at Lansing by Sheriff Frank Schram.

The law provides that during the period of the quarantine no dogs may be removed from the county unless they have been vaccinated against rabies within the last year and at least 60 days before the date of removal.

It also requires that all unvaccinated dogs be chained or confined securely. If allowed to run at large they must be muzzled. Officers are given authority to kill all dogs which are seen at large without muzzles or vaccination tags.

As the result of the quarantine which has been in effect in the county for about a year, hundreds of dogs have been killed. More than a score of persons have been bitten by mad dogs and many persons are now taking Pasteur treatments.

At Keego Harbor, one of the worst spots in the county, 21 dogs have been killed during the last few months by Deputy Loyall Wertz and three children have been bitten. Conditions are almost equally bad in Hazel Park where recently a number of dogs were killed after they attacked pupils in the Hazel Park school.

In addition to dogs killed by officers, scores of others have been shot by citizens who found them at large contrary to the provisions of the law.

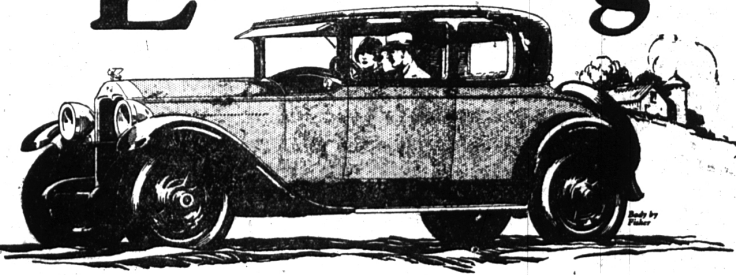

REGISTRATION BY AFFIDAVIT

Sec. 10.—Registering of Electors: Regular Session of 1925—Any absent voter, as defined in this act, whose name is not registered and who shall claim the right to vote by absent voter's ballot at any election or primary election, may, at the time of making application for absent voter's ballot present to the township clerk an affidavit for registration which shall be in substantially the following form: AFFIDAVIT FOR REGISTRATION

STATE OF MICHIGAN County of MICHIGAN I, citizen of the State of Michigan, being duly sworn, depose and say that I am a citizen and duly qualified elector of the precinct of the township of in the county of and State of Michigan; that my postoffice address is in street, city of R. F. D. No. in township of in the county of that I am not now registered as an elector therein and that I am voting by absent voter's ballot at the election (or primary election) to be held upon the day of 1928; the application for which ballot accompanies this application; that I make this affidavit for the purpose of procuring my registration as an elector in accordance with the statute; that I make the following statements in compliance with the Michigan Election Law: Age; Race; Birthplace; Date of naturalization; I further swear or affirm that the answers given to the questions concerning my qualifications as an elector are true and correct to the best of my knowledge and belief. Taken, subscribed and sworn to before me this day of 1928. Signed Notary Public in and for said County, State of Michigan.

REGISTRATION OF ABSENTEE BY OATH SEC. 9.—PART II—CHAP. III. If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election or primary election, and shall UNDER OATH state that he or she is a resident of such precinct and has resided in the TOWNSHIP TWENTY DAYS next preceding such election or primary election, designating particularly the place of his or her residence, and that he or she possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the Constitution; and that owing to the sickness or absence from the TOWNSHIP on public business or his or her family, or owing to his or her inability to appear at the election, he or she was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registering of electors preceding such election or primary election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he or she shall be permitted to vote at such election or primary election. If such applicant shall in said matter, willfully make any false statement, or she shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and upon conviction, be subject to the pains and penalties thereof.

PROVISION IN CASE OF REMOVAL TO ANOTHER PRECINCT SEC. 11.—PART II—CHAP. III. Any registered and qualified voter who has REMOVED from ONE ELECTION PRECINCT of a TOWNSHIP to another election precinct of the same TOWNSHIP shall have the right, on his or her name transferred to election, or primary election day, on application to Township Clerk, to have his or her name transferred from the registration book of the precinct from which he or she HAS REMOVED to the registration book of the precinct in which he or she THEN RESIDES. Such elector shall have the right to have such transfer made on any ELECTION, or Primary election day by obtaining from the board of inspectors of such election or primary election, and presenting the said certificate to the BOARD OF ELECTION INSPECTORS OF THE PRECINCT IN WHICH HE OR SHE THEN RESIDES.
