

'U' PROFESSOR PLANNING TRIP

Dr. W. Carl Rufus of the University of Michigan will be a member of the faculty of the coming "Floating University" which will leave New York, Oct. 8, 1928 for an eight month's cruise around the world, returning to New York in June, 1929.

There will be a faculty on board the vessel, of 30, selected from the prominent colleges of the United States.

Applications are received from

pre-collegiate students, undergraduates and from those desiring to take post-graduate courses. Credits for courses of study can be arranged for at most of the American colleges. It is open to men and women students.

Dr. Rufus will be accompanied by Mrs. Rufus who will act as chaperon for the group of women students from Michigan.

On the trips ashore, the students will be divided into groups going in the direction that the courses of study or preferences dictate. Those interested in art, music, history, geography, Botany, geology, international relations, sociology and economics will at times go in different directions from the main group.
