IDEALISM CALLED ASSET TO LIFE

That mankind is possessed of an "inecurable idealism," and that this idealism is the force that has brought him from the lowest state of civilization up to the present, and holds much for the future, was the substance of a talk given by the Rev. Floyd E. Logue, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, to his fellow-Rotarians here Monday noon.

"There is an idealism toward life that runs through the minds and hearts of all peoples, no matter what may be their conditions of living," stated Rev. Logue.

"Human relationships without idealism have always proved unsatisfactory. The movement such as Rotary fills a needed place in the life of people, and is made possible and necessary because of the inability of the church to be more practical in its teachings. The modern church is divided into two schools, the fundamentalist and the modernist; one troubled with the church is that it teaches Christianity too much in the abstract.

"Rotary is one of the finest expressions of practical Christianity," went on the speaker, "and we must do everything possible to keep this generation following the lines of practical idealism in human relationships."

Pineapple Pie — Drain juice from a No. 2 1/2 size can pineapple. Add one-half cup sugar and heat to boiling point. Beat three eggs well and stir into the sugar-juce mixture. Cook until thick, stirring well. Set aside to cool. Cut pineapple into small pieces and place in baked pie shell, pour custard over and cover with whipped cream.
