PLAN PRE-LENTEN CHURCH TALKS

Program of Sermons Announced by Baptist Church Pastor; Starts Sunday

Sunday will be the first day in which the Baptist Church services will be held at the Baldwin High school and will mark the beginning of two special series of Pre-Easter Sermons. One is for the morning service at 11 a. m. and one for the evening services at 7:30 p. m. At the Sunday morning services from now until Easter the Rev. David Leon Woodward, pastor of the First Baptist Church, will give a special series of sermons on "What I Believe—And Why I Believe It." The series as announced today are as follows:

March 11: "Why I Believe in God"; March 18: "Why I Believe in Jesus Christ"; March 25: "Why I Believe in Prayer"; April 1: "Why I Believe in the Bible"; April 8: (Easter Sunday) "Why I Believe in Life After Death."

According to Mr. Woodward, these messages constitute "The Heart of Christianity." Music will be furnished each Sunday by the Church Choir under the direction of Miss Mae Brunstead.

A series of five Sunday evening sermons on "The Great Characters of the Old Testament" are also announced to begin Sunday. Each of the Old Testament characters have been selected because they personify and embody cardinal virtues needed in our modern life, Mr. Woodward said. The series as announced by Mr. Woodward follows:

March 11: "Abraham—the Man of Faith"; March 18: "Job—the Man of Patience"; March 25: "Moses—the Man Who Was Meek"; April 1: "Isiah—the Man of Vision"; April 8: "Daniel—the Man of Courage."

The services will be non-sectarian in character and the public is invited. Those who have no regular church home are especially invited, Mr. Woodward said.
