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## VLIET TELLS OF EASTERN TRIP FOR ANNUAL N. E. A. MEETING

Superintendent Clarence Vliet at a teachers' meeting in the senior session room of the Baldwin building Monday afternoon, told of his trip to Boston at the National Educational association conference held there last week. His tour included Boston, Lexington, Concord, Plymouth, and New York.

The first general meeting was held in Machinists hall, Monday. Lawrence Lowell, president of Harvard University, opposed the efforts of high schools to undertake programs that are too large, and the high cost of education. Mr. Vliet cited the fact that eastern education is less costly than western since the average cost in Boston is \$104 and in Michigan it is \$140 per pupil.

"General taxation is driving the farmers into the cities," said Fletcher Smith, of the University of California, in his talk, Tuesday. "General taxes should be replaced by severance taxes on income taxes, and if we hope to carry on education, we must introduce an entirely new plan of taxation." He pointed out that one-third of present taxes are used in the maintenance of schools.

A joint meeting with the secondary school superintendents was held Tuesday evening, at which William McAndrews, the well known Chicago educator, spoke on the critical supervision of teachers. Thursday morning President Angel of Yale replied to Dr. Lowell. "The function of the high school is to assist in the education of the major population of the United States," he said. We try to make our students understand that they are in the employ of the state when in school. An aviation program, the first to be a part of an N. E. A. conference, was held Thursday. Among the 4,000 persons present the chief speakers were Col. Charles Lindbergh and Dr. Durand of Leland Stanford University. The presentation of a life membership in the N. E. A. to Mrs. Evangeline Lindbergh by Joseph N. Wain, superintendent in San Francisco was the evening's main event.

Miss Cornelia Adair, the only grade teacher ever to have become president of the N. E. A., announced that the next general N. E. A. meeting will be held in Minneapolis in July.

The remainder of Mr. Vliet's time was spent, on sight seeing and historical excursions. A special program was given for the N. E. A. at Plymouth and a beautiful program was presented in the Memorial Building. Guides were furnished to all historical points and the 10,000 visitors renewed acquaintance with historical facts and places.


