Catherine Lipka Succeeds Dorothy Cook As Worthy Advisor; Others Named

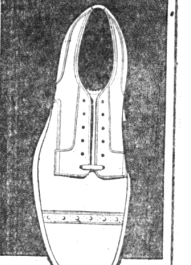
At the meeting of the Rainbow Girls held last week at the Masonic Temple, officers were elected and next Thursday was decided upon as the date for installation.
