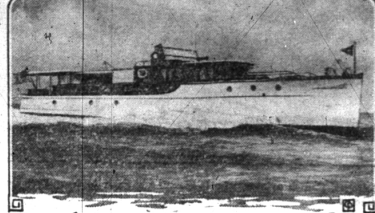
Board Seeks To Supply Calcium Chloride Here

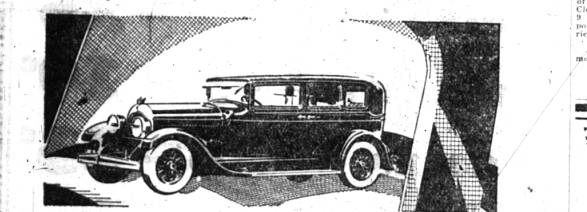

Regular meeting of the Village Commission held in the Village Hall, May 1st, 1928. Meeting called to order at 7:15 P. M. by President Allen, present at roll call: President, Allen; Commissioners, Wallace, Roehm, Talafiero and Whittlesey.

Minutes of regular meeting held April 4th, read and approved.

No. 219
Minutes of regular meeting held April 4th, read and approved.

Moved by Commissioner Wallace that following bills be referred to Village Engineer, Electrical Inspector: \$10.00 Blue & Hubbard Co. 34.00 Huston Htaw Co. 3.00 Bloomfield Center Service 62.19

Year 5; says none. Motion carried.

Moved by Commissioner Roehm, supported by President Allen, that electrical licenses be granted to Detroit Lighting and Fixing Co., Detroit, Mich., and Joseph Schroeder of Plymouth, Mich. Motion carried.

No. 221
Moved that position of Consumer Power Co. be referred to Village Engineer. Motion carried.

No. 222
Moved by Commissioner Whittlesey that report of Chief of Police be accepted. Motion approved.

No. 223
An application having been made by A. P. Brush to erect (10) nineteen single family garages, located on Woodward Ave., at southeast corner of Channing Ave., it appears that same garages do not comply with the zoning ordinance. Appeals, therefore, moved by Commissioner Talafiero that the application be denied by the Commission and that the matter be referred to the Board of Appeals for action under the provisions of the zoning law. Motion supported by Commissioner Wallace. Motion carried. Year 5; says none.

No. 224
An application was received from Edward J. Butler relative to his lot known as "Bloomfield Downs" asking for permission to use building lines as established on the same, when recorded instead of conforming to the building lines governed by the provisions of the Building Code.

After discussion thereof, including approval of the application by the Village Engineer, the following resolution was introduced by Commissioner Roehm:

"Resolved that the application of Edward J. Butler asking for permission to use the street building lines as established on said lot and recorded heretofore be granted and that permission is hereby granted to him and to other owners of lots on said subdivision to use and conform to the street building lines as established on and recorded plus anything whatsoever, subject to the contrary, not in the building code to the contrary, but E. J. Butler shall forever hold the Village harmless against any loss or damage that could possibly arise from the adoption of this resolution.

Commissioner Roehm moved the adoption of the resolution, seconded by President Allen. Roll call; year 5; says none. Motion carried.

Moved by Commissioner Roehm, supported by Commissioner Whittlesey, that Village purchase a Ford Tudor Sedan and that the present six cylinder police car be disposed of. Year 5; says none. Motion carried.
