Mr. Van Winkle, popularly known among the students as "Big Rip," has been in the schools of Birmingham five years. He plans to leave the village June 15, after school closes. His plans for the future are not announced.

## VILLAGE ORDERS WATER MACHINE

Precaution Taken By Village Against Possible Impurities In Drinking Source

A chlorinating machine, ordered by the village, is expected to arrive within three weeks, according to Manager James W. Parry. The authorization for the purchase was given by the village commission upon recommendation of Dr. A. W. Newitt, health officer.

Recent tests taken of Birmingham water have shown a slight contamination but so ill effects have been reported, Dr. Newitt said. The action of the commission is understood to be a precaution.

The machine is to cost \$1500 and will be attached to the well on Lincoln avenue.

## GROUP ACTIVE, REPORT SHOWS

Details Of Oakland Chapter, Crippled Child Society, Given

According to the quarterly report out today of the Oakland County Chapter of the Michigan Society for Crippled Children, there are 20 active cases of crippled children in Birmingham under treatment. During the past quarter in Birmingham, 27 calls have been made, five clinic visits and one local case removed to the University Hospital, the report submitted by Leola B. Jacques, physiotherapist, stated.

The treasurer's report showed a bank balance of \$10,969.68. Leslie J. Edmunds, secretary of the society reports that he has written a letter to each of the school boards in the county explaining the status of the crippled children's work in the county and urging them to give their earnest support in instructing their school census enumerators to make careful reports on every crippled child.

Plans are made by the society to hold a minimum of three and a maximum of four days work per week by a qualified physiotherapist for the crippled children of Royal Oak Township, working under the supervision of Miss Jacques.

Miss Jacques, who is in charge of the present work for the county, is to attend school in Boston, Mass., this summer where she will take courses in physiotherapy.

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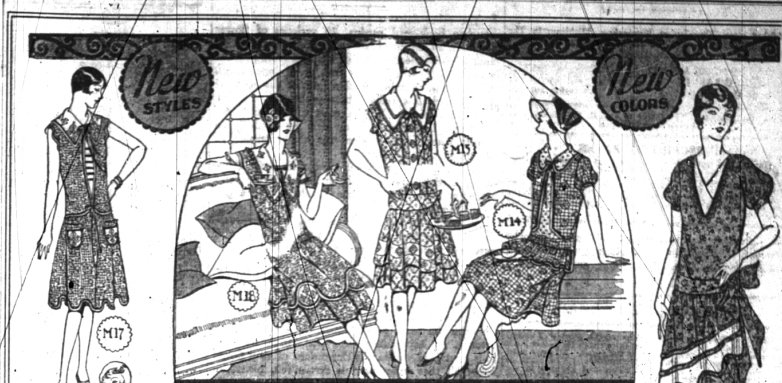
