# HASTY MARRIAGE, DIVORCE HIT IN MOTHER'S DAY SERMON

"To be a real mother is to join partnership with God," said the Rev. D. L. Woodward in his Mother's Day sermon at the Baptist Church Sunday morning. The Capper Bill is a step in the right direction. However, the problem cannot be solved merely by legislation. Legislation, in order to be effective, must be backed by a Christianized conscience and an intelligent public opinion.

"We can help to maintain the glory of motherhood by helping to maintain the religion which established the glory of motherhood and brought woman into her own." "The fruit of the spirit," said St. Paul, "is love, joy, peace, self-control." Now these spiritual qualities mentioned by Paul are the essential qualities of every mother. It is the faith of our mothers (as well as the Faith of our Fathers) that holds us firm in the time of temptation and keeps our feet from straying when to stray were sweet," he said.

"As sons and daughters, the duty of the child is to honor his mother. In answer to the question, I have two suggestions to offer: "Maintain the dignity of the home and the sacredness of the marriage and easy divorce are world have to look up into the threatening face of mothers who can neither read nor write, and who have heard the story of Jesus

and his love. As sons and daughters we do well to honor our mothers. But remember that only by honoring Christ may we maintain motherhood in its glory, purity and beauty, and pass on its blessings to the countless generations yet unborn."
