HOUSEHOLD HINTS

MENU HINT

Every wise housewife will include in her grocery order plenty of the dried fruits—prunes, figs, dates, raisins, apricots, etc. These may be used in various ways—stewed, in whips, puddings of various sorts, cake fillings, pies, etc.

Han Omelet—Fresh Asparagus, Head Lettuce, Cakes with Fig and Raisin Filling or Fruit Cookies.

Today's Recipes

Fig and Raisin Filling for Cake—One-fourth pound figs, one-fourth pound seeded raisins, one-half cup water, one-third cup sugar, Chop figs and raisins. Cook in the water until the figs are tender. Add sugar and cook slowly until it thickens. Cold before using. Put between layers of cake. Frost top with white icing.

Fruit Cookies—One cup sugar, one-half cup shortening, one egg, one cup sour milk, one teaspoon soda, one teaspoon lemon extract, five cups sifted pastry flour, one teaspoon salt. Cream the sugar with the fat, add the egg well beaten, the sour milk and soda, the lemon favoring the flour and the salt. The dough should be thick enough to roll very thin. Cut in rounds and between each two put a teaspoon of the following filling: One-half cup chopped fruit (figs, dates or raisins), one-half teaspoon salt, two tablespoons sugar, one-half cup water. Cook these ingredients together until thick. Bake cookies in moderate oven (350 degrees Fahrenheit) for ten or fifteen minutes.

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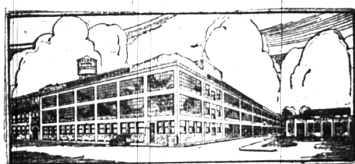

ILLUMINE MAPS FOR TRAVELERS

Illuminated maps, intended to serve principally as guides for travelers, have been installed at several of the larger railway stations in Sweden. The maps used at the Stockholm Central Station are two large-scale street plans of the city, one intended for showing the location of official buildings, hospitals, theaters, restaurants, etc., and the other to indicate the routes of the street-car lines, ferry lines and steamship connections.

Alongside each map is a list of the buildings and the communication lines, and opposite each name there is a small button. By the insertion of a 10-ore coin (2.68 cents) and pressing the button opposite the name of the building, or line whose location the traveler desires to ascertain, the building or line becomes illuminated for about one minute.

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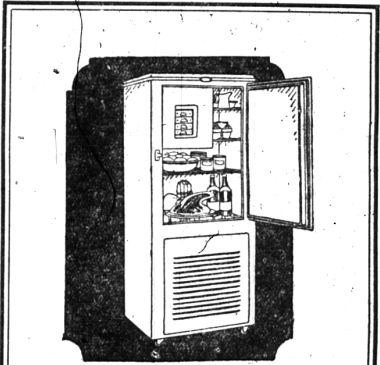
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
