(Concluded from Page 1, Part 2) one, who said Kelly attempted to short change him. When accused of the attempt, Kelly ran from the store. Thomas called to the youths, neither of whom has been identified, and the man was nabbed nearly a block from the store. One of the boys wore a Birmingham High School sweater with a "B" on it.

Thomas told Patrolman George Townsend who responded to the call that the man made a small purchase. After he received change he asked Townsend to give him a "2" for five "ones." When Thomas handed over the five dollar bill he inspected bills tendered him by Thomas. He found four one-dollar bills and one five, he said.

Kelly then asked for a ten dollar bill in return for the five and some change he placed on the counter. He already had the original "five," however, Thomas said.

A man suspected of being an accomplice of Kelly was apprehended by Townsend, taken to the station for questioning but released when he established that he had nothing to do with the alleged attempted theft.

Kelly said he was an iron worker and came to Birmingham to seek employment on one of the buildings now under construction. Police are checking his story.

CHAIN STORE BILL DEFEATED IN COURT

An anti chain store bill passed by the general assembly in Maryland was defeated recently in the circuit court of Allegany County as being unconstitutional and discriminatory. The bill provided that the operation of more than five stores by any one company would be breach of the law punishable by a fine of \$500 for each offense. It also imposed a license fee of \$500 for every chain store operated in addition to the regular license fees.
