Explanation of Auto Ride Is Vague, Officers Say  
**MAY BE SENT HOME**

Miss Margaret Bruley, 18 year old housemaid, who has been a patient in the St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Pontiac, undergoing treatment for a mysterious illness which seized her Sunday, while returning from Detroit, will soon return to her home in Canada with her mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Bruley, of 333 Westminster drive, Riverside, Ontario, Ontario hospital officials report.

The girl was brought to the Bloomfield Hills police station about 4 a. m.
