## BALDWIN VICTIMS IN NO-HIT NO-RUN TILT

## TRACKMEN OFF TO STATE MEET

Seven Athletes To Represent Baldwin At Lansing Tomorrow

Seven tracksters will represent Baldwin High School in the annual state interscholastic track meet at Michigan State College, Lansing, tomorrow and Saturday. Preliminaries will be held Friday and finals Saturday to determine the champions in the classes A, B, C and D.

The Maroon light elads who journey to Lansing tomorrow morning are those who placed in the state regional meet held at the State Normal College at Ypsilanti last Saturday. Birmingham placed third in class B, being surpassed by Wyandotte who won honors with 38 points and Dearborn, runnerup, who had 35 as a score. Birmingham recorded 23 1/2 units. Twelve schools competed in class B.

Robert Lyon scooped the best of the villagers, winning the 220 yard dash and placing fourth in the century sprint. Robert Cox tallied a first in the high jump. Morgan Carter won in second place in the 120 yard high hurdles and finished fourth in the low sticks. Milton Thompson captured a second in the 220 yard dash and placed second in the 230 yard hurdles. Captain Bour Brown tied for second place in the pole vault in the secondary division. Porteus captured a fourth in the 220 yard dash. These men, qualified themselves for the state meet in the events in which they played. The Baldwinites did not appear up to par in the competition at Ypsilanti and faced stiffer opposition in class B, than was shown in the class B division.
