Jesse Eash, prominent citizen and taxpayer, rises to say he bought an Oldsmobile with General tires back in September, 1922 and that, to quote his own letter to the General dealer, "not one of them tires ever blowed out and I can prove it by people that know the car."

"The enthusiastic Mr. Eash pays a doubtful compliment," says Leon B. Miller of the Miller Tire & Battery. General distributors in Birmingham, "when he bears down on the fact they never blow out."

"He does better by us farther on in his letter," continued Mr. Miller, when he says his two rear tires ran 45,000 miles, the left front 34,000 miles and that his right front tire is still in use and has gone 72,000 miles.

"But," continued the dealer, "Mr. Eash doesn't give us any news when he says his tires 'never blowed out.' On the other hand it would have been important news if they had."

"Tires nowadays do not blow out, at least not in the sense they used to. They wear out, and in their own good time. I am speaking of course of good high grade tires, the first line products of the best manufacturers."

"It is a fact," continued Mr. Miller, "motorists traveling along on well worn, tread bare cord tires in these days, are perhaps more secure against blow out disturbances than they might have been on some new tires a few years back."
