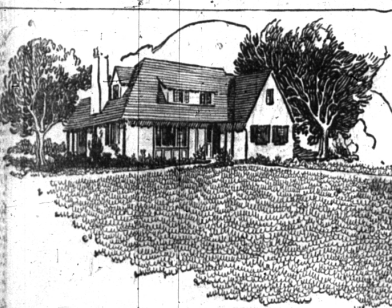
Wedge's pitching proved almost on a par with Tompkins, each walked one, the former fanned 12.

Within a week or 10 days you will receive from the chairman of your state committee a certificate of accrediting that will be valid for the period ending March 16, 1929. In explanation of the term of accrediting we wish to state that it is the policy of the North Central association to approve secondary schools from year to year.
