Team Rounding Into Shape For Season's Games Soon To Start

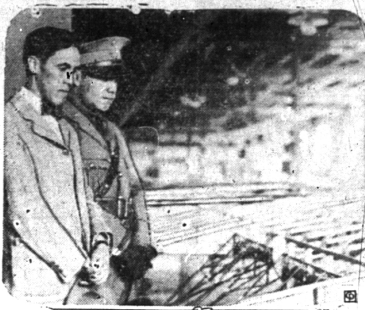

A. A. A. MAKES SHIPPING CAR TO EUROPE AN EASIER TASK

Washington—Once all preparations are made it is easy for an American to tour Europe in his own automobile.

The preparations are quite numerous and complicated. But even these have been reduced to a minimum through a special service for this purpose maintained by the American Automobile Association.

In a booklet, "Motoring Abroad," the A. A. A. details complete information as to how an American tourist may ship his car abroad and tour the European countries without difficulty or fear of being molested.

Nowadays automobiles are shipped uncrated, and the steamship companies have gone so far as to

take the entire responsibility for this job out of the hands of the car owner. All a motorist need do is ride up to the ship, leave his car there and forget about it until he lands at the European port.

At the other end, an agent of the A. A. A. sees that the car is supplied with fuel and oil and is passed through customs for the owner.

Passport and Visa Obtaining the necessary papers for touring abroad is a more complicated task.

First comes the passport. This is issued whether a car is taken along or not. It is obtainable from the clerk of the local U. S. district court at a cost of \$10. Applicants must present two small, unretouched photographs of themselves, one signed, but it is advisable to keep a dozen more, for these are frequently demanded during an European journey.

After the passport comes a visa for each country to be visited. These are obtainable in New York at the various consular offices.

That is the regular requirement for all tourists. Those taking their automobiles, in addition, have to have three additional documents, besides going through other forms of red tape. All this is made easy for the tourist if he will merely write to the foreign touring department of the A. A. A. in Washington, and have it prepare the necessary papers and formalities.

Paper For Owners The papers include:

1—A "triptique" or customs pass for the temporary importation of a car into one country only.

2—A "carnet de passage en douane" or international customs pass for passage into 12 of the most important countries in Europe, thus taking the place of 12 triptiques.

3—An "international traveling pass" or driver's license for each person intending to drive in Europe. This document requires five photographs of each driver, passport size, with a photostat copy of the home state driving license where there is no such license, a certificate from the local chief of police certifying the driver's ability to operate a car.

The A. A. A. has all this ready for the motorist when he checks at the port of entry. All the motorist does is fill out a form provided by the association and send it in with a deposit of \$50 toward expenses for the various papers and licenses to be obtained. Whatever additional sum is due is collected by the A. A. A. after the trip.

DOG COLLECTORS START IN COUNTY

Check To Be Made On Unlicensed Dogs In All Townships

Dog license collectors are working today in every township of Oakland County under the direction of Deputy C. C. Johnson. The collectors are to visit every house in the county and check the ownership of every dog. Animals for whom no owners can be found are to be killed. Dog owners who are unable to show receipts for their licenses will have to pay a tax of \$4 for males and \$6 for females.

Deputy Johnson said today it would be unnecessary for anyone to visit the county treasurer to pay taxes as the collectors would call at every house. It may require three months or more for the task.

Sheriff Frank Schram believes the check on dogs will do much to abate the rabies epidemic here as the collectors are expected to report owners who are failing to observe the quarantine regulations recently imposed here by the sheriff after a conference with State Veterinarian B. J. Killham.

Under the quarantine, all dogs are forbidden to run at large unless muzzled. Dogs which have been vaccinated are not excluded from this order.
