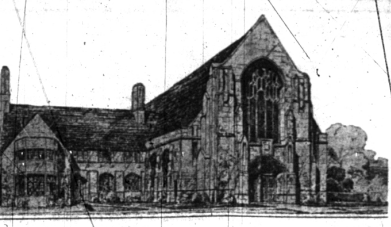

**NEW BAPTIST CHURCH**

This is a sketch of the new First Baptist Church at Willets and Bates streets. The cornerstone will be laid Sunday. The auditorium will have a seating capacity of 900. Directly below the auditorium is the banquet hall of the church which will be used each Sunday as the assembly room of the senior and adult departments of the church—approximately 400. This combination banquet-assembly hall has a seating capacity of about 400 with a stage at the south end, so that it may also be used for concerts, entertainments, and dramatics. A moderately equipped kitchen and two club rooms for men and boys adjoin the dining room at the north end of the lower floor. The "main floor" of this educational unit will contain the pastor's study, church office, prayer meeting room, ladies' parlor, cradle roll department, young women's club room, kitchenette and lavatories. On the "lower floor" of the west wing will be found the spacious, light and airy



rooms for the Beginners and Primary departments of the Church School. In addition to the heating equipment and lavatories, the top floor of this wing will contain a gymnasium, which will be used on Sundays as the assembly hall for the Junior and Intermediate departments. In the balcony above the gymnasium are separate shower rooms for both boys and girls. Adjoining the gymnasium-assembly hall are 14 individual class rooms for the juniors and intermediates. The church is of Gothic style architecture throughout and is being constructed of Indiana limestone.

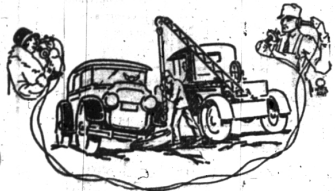

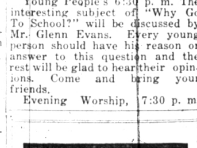

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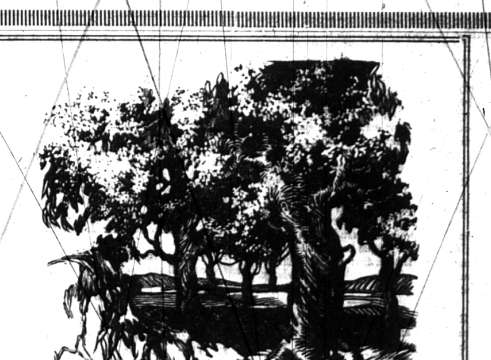
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
