Those who placed are Roderick Cox who nabbed a second in the high jump, Captain Rodgers Brown who tied for third in the same event, Robert Lyon, who won a third place in the century dash, Milton Thomson who placed third in the 220 yard low timbers and Morgan Carter who topped the high hurdles in third place. The Maroon men competed with light clads of 35 schools.

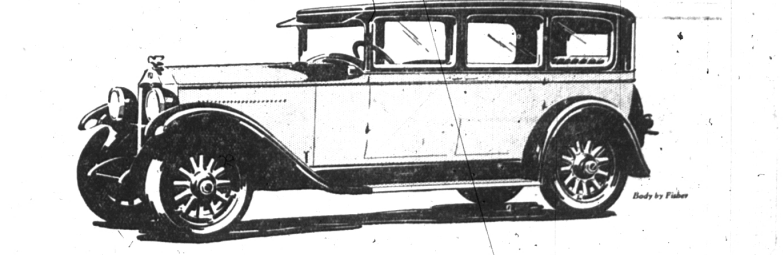
