

HOOVER WIN PREDICTED BY BIG MAJORITY

Expect 1,500,000 Votes To
Be Bolled At Tuesday's
Elections

GIVES STATE OPINION

(Special) The Eccentric
Lansing, Nov. 1.—Herbert Hoover will be elected president Nov. 6 in a landslide unprecedented in the political history of this country.

Gov. Fred W. Green, Arthur H. Vandenberg, and the entire state Republican ticket will be elected by the usual Republican margin, increased in total by the best vote in the history of the state.

These are the predictions of Gerrit J. Diekema, chairman of the Republican State Central committee, in a statement issued from state headquarters here today. Mr. Diekema based his predictions so far as Michigan is concerned on information he has obtained in trips during the last three weeks into all sections of Michigan.

Upwards of 1,500,000 Michigan voters will go to the polls next Tuesday, Mr. Diekema estimates, about 400,000 more than have voted in any previous election, and of this increase he estimates that Hoover will obtain upward of 300,000, making his total vote in the state about 1,000,000.

"The 150,000 vote increase is overwhelmingly in favor of Mr. Hoover, Senator Vandenberg and the state ticket," said Mr. Diekema. "Wayne County, where the Democrats have been centering their efforts in the closing days of the campaign, will also go Republican."

An indication of the view the laboring man is taking in this election is shown by the fact that 50,000 men in the employ of one Detroit company voluntarily signed pledges to vote for Mr. Hoover and our state ticket.

Hoover Sentiment General
"We have found through a careful survey of Michigan that the Hoover sentiment is general, while that for the Democratic candidate is spotted."

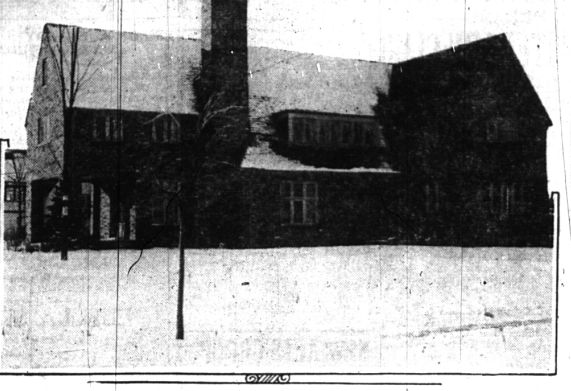
Dennis E. Alward, veteran secretary of the Republican State Central committee, who has taken a direct active part in more presidential campaigns in this state than any of the present day party leaders, joins with Mr. Diekema in his prediction.

"It is going to be a Republican landslide, both state and national," said Mr. Alward today. "The issues in the present campaign have been few and pointed. They have been presented by both sides, and the voters have shown an unusual interest as the campaign progressed. There has been a steady and decided swing to the Republican standard during the campaign."

"The Republican platform is one which appeals to the voter. It is a guarantee of continued prosperity; it presents a definite program of farm relief; it stands for law and order; it opposes a more liberal policy of immigration. It offers every assurance of progress to industry, to labor, to the farmer, and to the home."
