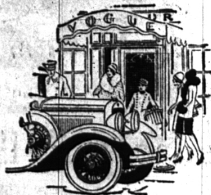

Music will be furnished by the choir of the Presbyterian Church, Rev. Woodward stated, and Rev. Lodge, pastor of the entertaining church, will read the scripture lesson.

Rev. Warner Forsyth, pastor of the St. James Episcopal church, will deliver the Thanksgiving sermon, and Rev. Henry Evans, pastor of the United Presbyterian Church will offer the prayer. It is expected that the attendance at this annual service will be even larger than in previous years, Rev. Woodward stated.

STAR DISPLAY DUE TONIGHT

**Most Brilliant Of Shooting
Orbits May Be Seen
Here**

Birmingham tonight will witness what is said to be the most brilliant display of shooting stars in 33 years. Bulletins from the Yerkes Observatory, Williams Bay, Wis., state that tonight the earth moves into the astral region of the Leonid meteors, which are thought to be the remnants of a comet.

These meteors are said to whirl in an orbit which crosses the earth's path and every 33 years the earth passes through the center of the Leonid Orbit. It is the heat of the earth which ignites the meteors, scientists say. They are usually consumed before they strike ground, however.

Unless the sky is not clear, the phenomenon may be witnessed without the aid of glasses.

COUNTY TO GET SEALS NOV. 29

**Approximately 4,000,000
Markers To Be Placed In
Mails On Thanksgiving**

Lansing, Michigan, Nov. 14.—The annual sale of Christmas seals in Oakland County will be officially opened on Thanksgiving Day when approximately 4,000,000 seals, addressed to residents of the county, will be placed in the mails.

Nov. 29 will also mark the opening of the seal sale throughout Michigan. \$4,000,000 seals, according to officials of the Michigan Tuberculosis association, will be placed on sale at that time in the 83 counties of the state. This figure represents an increase of 8,000,000 over the number distributed last year.

Statistics of the 1927 sale show that \$9,785.48 worth of the seals were sold last year in Oakland County. The per capita sale, based on the population of the county, was \$8.04. This per capita sale for the state in 1927 was \$5.63.

Based on the figures of the 1927 sale, when the 70,000,000 seals which were placed on sale resulted in gross receipts of \$247,443.78, M. A. officials estimate that \$275,000.00 will be raised in the sale this year. Chest clinics, children's camps, educational lectures, scientific research, and health campaigns are included in the public health work financed by the seal sale.

Scalloped Apples

(Mrs. Mary Morton's Daily Tested Recipe.)

One quart sliced apples, one-fourth cup butter, one-fourth cup sugar, one-fourth teaspoon grated nutmeg, one-half lemon, grated rind and juice, two cups bread crumbs. Melt butter and stir into crumbs slightly with a fork. Cover bottom of buttered baking dish with crumbs and spread over one-half of apples, sprinkle with one-half sugar, nutmeg and lemon juice and rind mixed together; repeat, cover with remaining crumbs and bake 40 minutes in moderate oven. Cover at first to prevent crumbs from browning too rapidly.
