Household Hints

MEQU HINT
Meat Loaf—Creamed Cabbage
Vegetable Salad
Bran Rolls or Bread
Upside-Down Cake
Coffee
This amount of meat loaf will make enough for eight people. Creamed cabbage is used in the place of potatoes.

Today's Recipes
Meat Loaf—One-fourth pound ham, one-fourth pound fresh pork, one-half pound real or beef, one cup crumbs, one-half cup milk, tomato or water, one teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, one egg. Chop meat, mix and add remaining ingredients in order given. Shape into loaf, put in pan, dredge with flour and roast in hot oven one and one-half hours, basting occasionally, the first time with one-third cup hot water, afterwards with the fat in the pan.

Upside-down Cake—In a large iron aluminum frying pan melt one and one-half tablespoons of butter, add enough brown sugar to cover well the bottom of pan, and get over a low heat to partially melt the sugar. Drain the syrup from a can of canned peaches or pineapple. If peaches, place hollow side down in pan. Fill the spaces between the fruit with raisins and chopped nuts. In a mixing bowl cream two tablespoons butter with three-fourths cup sugar. Add, one at a time, two unbeaten eggs; when the mixture is light and fluffy add gradually two cups flour sifted with two teaspoons baking powder and an eighth teaspoon salt, and two-thirds cup of milk. Lastly add one teaspoon vanilla. Beat vigorously and pour this mixture into the frying pan above thoroughly baked pineapple from oven and immediately invert the pan, placing the cake on a plate. Bake for one and one-half hours, and once with whipped cream. May be served cold.

Suggestion
Choose ingredients for salads of foods that blend well, lending one another zest and flavor. They must be thoroughly washed and the lettuce dried by putting into a clean dry cloth bag and shaken gently up and down.

How to Achieve Beauty

Beauty is always being menaced by some danger—whether it is worry or neglect or old age. And hair beauty, being rather a special loveliness, has as its menace, the great white plague, or dandruff. Now dandruff is one thing the particular woman cannot afford to overlook—for outside of the actual harm it does to the health of your scalp, it is a most embarrassing annoyance. Anyone who has seen the little white dust fluffing the shoulders of a dark gown is bound to feel that any cure is to be preferred to the disease—make no mistake about it.

Treat dandruff as you would a skin disorder. Be sensible, faithful and scientific in your care. Oil shampoos should have their place in your attentions. A good hot oil treatment followed by a bi-activating shampoo is a bi-monthly treatment that should produce marvelous results in a very short time. Heat the oil—either hansom oil, castor oil or olive oil is good—the former is more easily washed out—then a little enamel cup—about two tablespoons of oil is plenty. Separate your hair and massage the oil well into the parts. Rub, but if necessary, if possible, retain overnight, binding your hair up in a lightweight towel. Shampoo thoroughly, using three or four lathers and scalds of hot water in the morning.

Try to give your head a "breath of fresh air" every now and then. Tight hats are bad for scalp circulation, and consequently a little dangerous in their tendency to discourage new and vigorous hair growth. Go without a hat all you can. It will aid immeasurably in the fight that this "cleared" "urban-d" generation must wage against baldness!

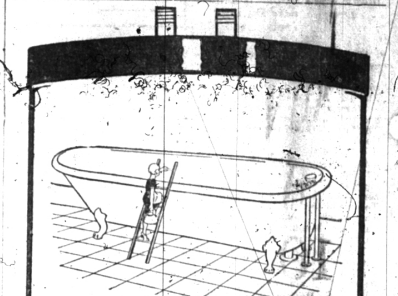
