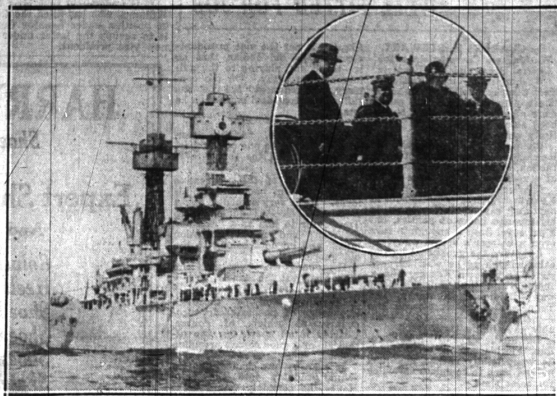

WHAT IS GOVERNMENT?
We have a careless way of thinking that the government is one thing and the people are another. We think of the government as standing at one side ready to enforce something or other on the people—even against the people's will. Of course the government and the people are one and the same thing. The reason we do not have prohibition in this country instead of merely a large amount of TALK about prohibition is that not enough people want the enforcement of prohibition. The government—which is the people—cannot enforce upon the people what the people do not want.

"ENFORCEMENT"
Please note that in the above paragraph the thing referred to is not "prohibition" but the "enforcement of prohibition." It is very probable that most of the people actually do want prohibition. They have voted in favor of it and they would doubtless do so again in practically every state in the union. But it is also apparently true that they do not want it enforced to the degree that would make it impossible for them to have a drink quietly on the side. The well-to-do want it enforced on the poor and the poor perfectly willing to have it enforced on the well-to-do. A great number of people—perhaps a greater number—believe prohibition is a splendid idea, always deserving of their vote. But enforcement—that is another matter.

CHECKING UP
Now that election is over we will do well to look back over some of the things we have believed, and some of the things we have said. After a time of abnormal excitement and distorted opinions it is proper to check up on ourselves and try to recall just how we acted and what we said. All with a view to not being quite so absurd in the next campaign.

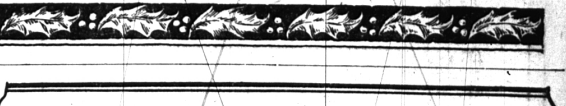
