

SEEK TO BUILD AIRPORT NEAR BIRMINGHAM

Royal Oak Commission Asked To Furnish Port And Factory Will Be Built

RESULTANT BOOM SEEN

An airport and airplane factory near Birmingham loom today following a petition to the city commission of Royal Oak by the Stinson Aircraft Corporation.

The matter is in the hands of the city commission of Royal Oak. The site under consideration is on the east Maple road and the Crooks road about two miles east of Birmingham.

The factory will be built if the city provides the airport. The Stinson Aircraft Corporation, of Stinson, Minn., is the owner of the property.

The factory would cost \$200,000 and employ 200 men and the corporation is ready to start work at once if the airport is provided, he said. The tract of land under consideration is 160 acres in size.

Resulting industrial booms to

the vicinity was cited to the commission by Mr. Lingeman.

The values of a municipal airport were enumerated by Harry J. Merritt who headed the Royal Oak Exchange club committee which worked to secure a county airport for the city. A port would pay dividends to the community because of the growth of the community and the increased taxation which would result from the factories, he said.

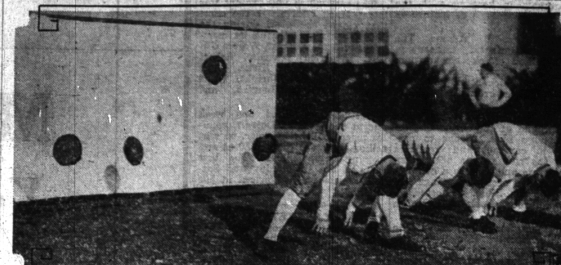
Serious consideration of the proposition will be given by the city commission, it is reported. However, doubt as to whether the estimate cost of \$300,000 to \$500,000 for the site could be negotiated, was expressed by members.

DRIVER HURT IN COLLISION

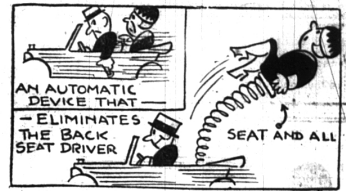
Woodward Avenue Scene Of Accident Saturday Night

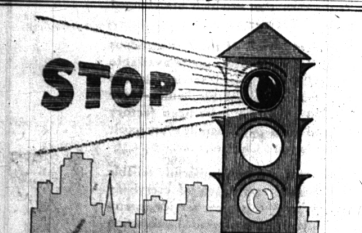
