OAKLAND HILLS PAYS TRIBUTE TO DEVISSER

Newly Re-elected President Honored by Stag Party At Club

Toppling off the outdoor season of the Oakland Hills Country Club, a gala stag day and special tournament was held yesterday at the club honoring J. E. DeVisser of Birmingham who was re-elected president of the club at the board of directors meeting last Thursday. More than 250 members were present at the banquet and approximately 150 took part in the novel tournament.

The affair was opened with a buffet luncheon at noon followed by an afternoon of golf. The match was unique in that each player was allowed only two clubs, a putter and one other stick of his own choice. All the players in addition to their golf clubs wore tan berets and used cosmetics.

TURKISH COLLEGE DISCUSSED HERE

Constantinople's Women's college, discussed in a talk by Miss Shuyley Slane Moudhidi at the meeting of the American Association of University Women held at the home of Mrs. Arthur J. Brandt on Kennesaw avenue yesterday.

Mrs. Moudhidi is from Constantinople and has been in this country but five and one half years. She is a graduate of the University of Michigan and from her experiences here compared American college life with Turkish.

The point which Miss Moudhidi stressed was the great similarity of women college students in the two countries.

She sees a salvation for the existing social order by the education of its women. "A college background gives the Turkish woman an opportunity to push into social work. This will gradually break down the distinction which is hampering the advancement of Turkey," she said.

Mrs. T. D. McMillan, of Detroit, who is familiar with the educational problems in China and Japan, being in the latter country at the time of the last earthquake, spoke on colleges there. Mrs. Hope Halgren's report on the colleges of the Near East completed the program for the afternoon.
