Oakland Hills Country club has the greatest 36-hole golf course in the world. This is the statement of Donald East, world famous golf architect.

Now a huge white frame building across from the former clubhouse accommodates the 602 members from Detroit, Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills. The clubhouse is a replica of "Mt. Vernon" and commands a view of the hilly country northwest of Birmingham.

Many great tournaments have been held on this course. Next September will see the playing of the Women's National golf championship here at Oakland Hills. At that time the famous Bobby Jones, of Atlanta, Ga., was runner-up in 72 holes of play with a score of 200. He was defeated by Cyril Walker who scored a 297.
