SECOND TEAM HAS EASY TIME WITH BERKLEY

Revenge For Previous Defeat At Hands Of Down Rivermen Sought

BATTLE IS EXPECTED

Still, it can be applied to the River Rouge game tomorrow. The game is played at the Pierce field at 3:45 p. m. A victory on the part of Baldwin High School will be a revenge for the accomplished little drubbing that the Rouge men handed them last year. River Rouge was the S. E. A. champion last year and in winning eight of nine matches the Baldwins were conquered 12-0.

last Friday afternoon by the count of 26-0. Coach George Johnson's performers have four successive wins under their belt. Holly was tipped over in the first bout, 54-12. Fontaine went under 18-6, and Grasso Pointe was defeated 26-12. The reason for these attainments can be ascribed in three words—"good offensive tactics."

The reserves found ample opportunity in the scrap with Berkley to demonstrate their grid knowledge. Expect for Ray Mix and Floyd Doherty, letter men who started, the team was entirely substitute players. In all, the reserves did not do so badly. Two touchdowns were scored while the regulars in the lineup, James Dren is the outstanding corner of the second squad. Playing at fullback, he never seemed at a loss as to what he was doing. He pushed the ball along repeatedly, his running mate most of the time being Doherty. Together they tested the ball nicely. Doherty scored the first touchdown in the first quarter after he and Brian had stepped through repeated openings in the line which the "subs" were making. A march of five first downs ended in the first score on a line rush. Brian blackicked the additional point. The score at the end of the first period, was 7-0.

The two aggregations see-sawed

through the second quarter with nothing much happening. Birmingham added two more first downs while Berkley failed to get into action.

Coach Johnson began to shift the variety men by the third quarter. Hermann Schwartz assumed the quarterback position and accounted for several creditable gains before Brian scored the second marker by hitting the line. Brian also was responsible for most of the punting and passing while he was in the game. The score at the beginning of the final quarter was 14-0.

A pass from Brian to Berger netted 22 yards soon after the final episode began. This was followed up by Donald Gore who played the oval for a touchdown. Root kicked the extra point. Berger, Gore, R. Schwartz, and Root had all entered the game shortly before they were doing what variety players are expected to do. Capt. Roderick Cox entered the game and steam-rolled around the yard. Ten yards from the goal line two tacklers snagged him and he went down, but the men who hit him were slightly stunned and he regained his feet and scored. Gore and Cox with practically a full regular line before them opening spaces, continued to gain and as the game ended H. Schwartz reared 27 yards around the end.

Birmingham made 16 first downs, nine of which were in the last half. Berkley made two.

A plucky fight despite the odds was exhibited by the Berkley team. They were smaller than Birmingham and faced a hard enough job against the Maroon reserves, not to mention the first-down Grace and Cuyler were the ball carriers who were notable in the Berkley backfield.
