

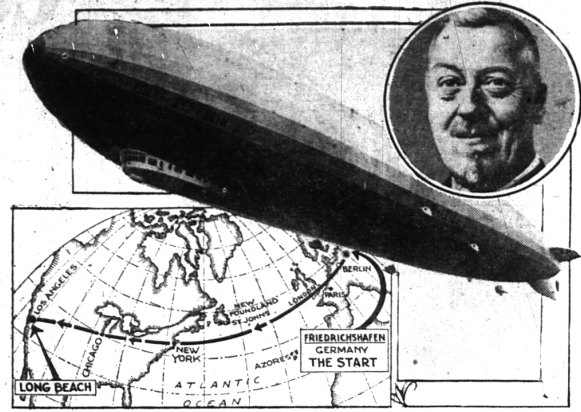

## REMNANT OF AMUNDSEN TRAGEDY



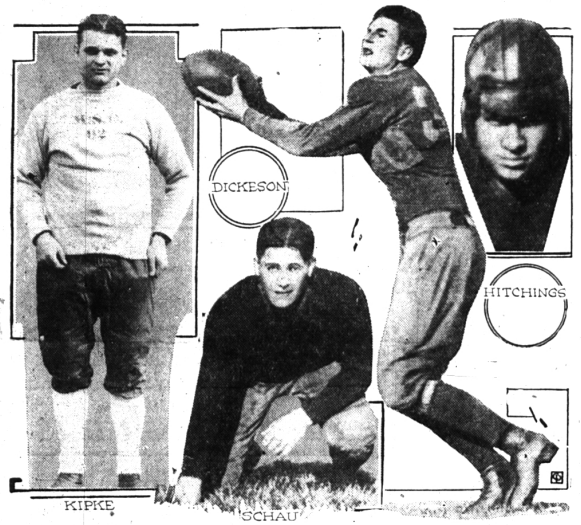

## Heads Aero Confab



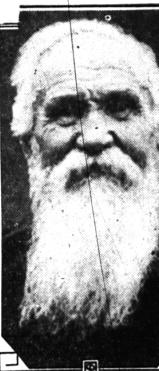
