CONSTRUCTION OF CAR SAVES MANY LIVES

One person was seriously injured, Ray Willford, 1205 1/2 north Saginaw street, Flint, is in the St. Joseph Mercy Hospital suffering spinal injuries. All of the 30 commuters received slight cuts and bruises. Mrs. George Boyles, First street, Rochester, was injured about the legs and hips, and Fred Brogy, Romeo street, Rochester, was also badly cut and bruised. The fracture of several ribs was sustained by Arthur Koon, Flint.

An account of the accident was given by the motorman, Charles E. Bennett, of Flint, who says this was his first accident in 17 years of interurban piloting.

"The car was traveling about 60 or 65 miles an hour when I approached the curve," he said, "I applied the brake about 300 feet before reaching it, but it failed to hold so I attempted to put the motor into reverse. This failed to halt the car and I was powerless to do anything. As the car tipped, rounding the bend, the strong steel construction of the car saved their lives. Only

NEW PHONES PLANNED FOR BIG BEAVER

Bell Company To Complete Work On Exchange In November
WILL COST \$20,000.00

A telephone exchange costing approximately \$20,000 will be in operation in Big Beaver about Nov. 1, it is announced by Robert J. Coyle, district superintendent for the Michigan Bell Telephone company.

More complete service is merited in this section because of the residential growth and general development, Mr. Coyle said. The territory around Big Beaver which is now supplied service from Birmingham, Pontiac, Royal Oak and Kalamazoo exchanges is found inadequate in the territory around Big Beaver, he said. The project of an exchange in Big Beaver is seen as a preparation for future business expansion and increase in population.

A central office is to be located on Boyd street one half block east of the Rochester road. The completely modern equipment is to be installed in a five room house especially planned for the use of the exchange. The house will provide room for business offices in addition to being the home of Mrs. Lucille Jengries, the company's operating agent.

The approximate expenditure of \$20,000 will include the cost of all equipment to be installed in the office and installation of more than 25,000 feet of aerial telephone cables. Cables are now being placed in all sections of the community.

HINTS concerning your Heating Problems

We feel that if the people who use coal better understood the factors necessary for them to observe in firing their furnace, many of the difficulties which they have would not trouble them.

We will try and mention some of them.

Always keep ashes removed from the ash pit, because if you allow the ashes to pile up underneath you run the risk of warping or melting your grate bars. Because of the high cost of hard coal many homes are turning to pocahontas coal or coke as they are both of them clean burning, smokeless and leave no soot.

Care should be taken when using pocahontas as fuel to maintain a deep bed of coal in fuel chamber with not too much draft, also see to it that when refueling that you do not cover all of live coals.

If you leave a bright ring of fire on one side of your furnace you will never have a backfire or explosion. Coke needs much less draft than does coal for economical combustion, but on account of its very light weight you will need to keep an extra deep fuel bed.

In most furnaces it is a good practice to allow the ashes to accumulate to a depth of two or three inches on top of the grate bars.

The coke will get plenty of air through the shallow bed of ashes and even then you should not leave the draft on but a few minutes or it will get the start of you.
