SCHOOL BOARD REDEEL SEEN
 Attorney General To Rule On Status Of Maplecrest Jurisdiction

Status of the Maplecrest School, whose jurisdiction is being questioned by the Birmingham and Royal Oak boards of education will be decided by the state attorney general, as was agreed by both the boards at a joint meeting here Monday.

Unless the decision is satisfactory to both sides, it was further agreed, a friendly suit will be started in the state supreme court.

The school, a one room building, was taken from Birmingham by Royal Oak in August, and the annexation of the school was upheld in the county circuit court when a suit was started.

The regular meeting of the Board of Education was held in the office at 8 P. M.

Present: R. J. Coryell, Ray A. Palmer, Fred V. Quorton and Guy W. Jensen.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Moved by Jensen, supported by Quorton that President R. J. Coryell and Secretary Ray A. Palmer be authorized to make necessary loans for school District No. 1 Fractional, Bloomfield in anticipation of the direct tax levy for 1928-1929 which is \$408,780.77.

Yeas: Coryell, Palmer, Quorton, Jensen.

Nays: None.

Moved by Jensen, supported by Quorton that Mr. George A. Dendero and Mr. O. H. Foster, Jr., be asked to attend the next meeting of the Board of Education on Monday, October 8, and discuss the details of the proposed transfer of the Maplecrest School to the School District of the City of Royal Oak.

Thursday evening, October 11, from 7:30 to 10:30 was set for the inspection of the new Quorton school by parents, teachers and interested citizens. The Board of Education assisted by the Quorton teachers will be the hosts of the evening and an informal program will be given in the auditorium with light refreshments and dancing at its close.

It was agreed that if the preliminary Night School meeting of Tuesday, September 25 should show enough interested students to warrant the formation of classes, that the first meeting would be held, October 2, with Principal M. C. Hart in charge.

The Detroit Stokers Company was directed to be notified by letter as to the loss caused the Board of Education by the failure of said Company to complete the installation of stokers in the Adams and Baldwin buildings resulting in being necessary to close both buildings for lack of heat on the following dates: Adams, September 24, 25, 26, Baldwin, September 25.
