ANNEXATION UP TO SUPERVISORS
Annexation petitions for an area including Hazel Park, and which are presently being filed following the September primaries by both Royal Oak and Ferndale, may be declared invalid by the Oakland County board of supervisors, it is understood.
The annexation of territory east of Royal Oak including Hazel Park was on the Royal Oak ballot Sept. 4, but failed to carry because of lack of the required number of votes. Before an official result was announced, Royal Oak filed a new petition and Ferndale also showed activity in the requirement of Hazel Park by placing petitions on the days of the county clerk two days after the election.
Because both documents were filed before the vote had been officially canvassed by the county board of election canvassers, Norman C. Orr, assistant prosecutor, stated that they were invalid. The committee on boundaries of cities and villages will report their decision during the present session. It was referred to them following a reading, Tuesday morning. The committee is expected to follow Mr. Orr's instruction in reporting on the two petitions which were found to be in proper form and bearing the required number of signatures.
